




- Half (52 per cent) of UK employers say young people entering the workforce are generally not 'job ready', citing significant gaps in workplace skills and social adaptability.*
- Just over a quarter of employers (28 per cent) that hired a young person aged 16-24 in the past year felt they were well prepared for the demands of the workplace.
- Among the most significant challenges identified by employers were **behavioural issues**, with 71 per cent stating young people often did not know how to behave in **professional settings**.






Our Overall Essentials- And how you can help!




Our Overall Essentials – Attendance

%	Days Missed	Weeks Missed	Lessons missed (and study periods)	Impact
100	0 days	0	0	
95				Small gaps – top grades still possible with catch-up
90				Persistent absence threshold – strong risk of lower grades
85				High risk – syllabus coverage missed, likely grade drop
80				Severe – hard to complete content, high chance of underperformance
75				Very severe – major loss of learning, multiple grade drops expected
70				Critical – unlikely to achieve predicted grades, progression at risk
65				Extreme – often leads to failure/resits or alternative pathways

Student Expectations - Independent Study

- ☐ All students will have a round 10-12 hours non timetabled periods (not in a lesson)
- ☐ All students must remain on school site and study in the Sixth Form dedicated areas during this time
- ☐ All students have a Teams Page which allows teachers to set work and for students to be able to communicate with their teachers
- □ At home/after school, we expect all students to study a minimum of an additional <u>3 5 hours per subject each</u> week.



Student Expectations - Independent Study

How can you support academic learning outside of school?

Students will be given additional work to complete by their teachers to support & enrich their learning. Please do talk to them about this at home, using the questions below as guidance!

- ➤ **Revision** Where can they revise? Where is a quiet space which provides focus?
- ➤ Exam practice What are they doing to practice & learn/progress? What conversations are they having at school? Are they using the resources available to them?
- ➤ Wider reading Do they use their local library? The school library? Do they use the channels on their Teams to find out about documentaries/podcasts?
- ➤ Elevate Education Webinars We also send these out to parents with advice on studying, revision, practice, supporting during exams & with anxiety/worries. Please check your emails throughout the school year!


Student Bursary (Ms Donnellan) - Financial Support

- ☐ The 16 to 19 Bursary Fund provides financial support to help students pay for the costs of participating in their Sixth Form education. (FSM)
- ☐ Funding is provided by the Education & Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) and administered by St Augustine's Sixth Form
- □ Students will <u>only be able to purchase</u> textbooks/stationary/materials needed for the courses in which they are studying in Sixth form.



- Supervising your child or ensuring a calm environment asking them to do these in timed conditions!





What is Unifrog?



unifrog

- □Unifrog is a further education online platform which the school invests in for our students
- □ It supports us to provide students with impartial and independent guidance on the full range of post-school options
- □ It gives the students access to up to the minute information on all universities in the UK, their courses, their entry requirements, taster lectures, talks by students . . .
- □ It offers comprehensive information on apprenticeships, what is available, how and when to apply, application guidance . . .
- □It offers psychometric testing to help students to decide on which careers are best for them



Start now ...



- Most students will already have Unifrog accounts
- Students need to start using the platform now!
- Form Tutors will guide them through the basics once a week
- Students need to start looking at what is out there in terms of universities, apprenticeships, training and thinking about what they want to do when they leave St. Augustine's

Predicted Grades



- Students' predicted grades for the UCAS applications will be based ENTIRELY on UCAS exams
- Teachers WILL NOT bump up grades just so that students can enter for a particular course or university
- We have a duty to support your child's applications but that includes being realistic, therefore, if they don't get the necessary grades in their UCAS exams, then we will assist them to find alternative courses.
- This also ensures parity, all students will be treated equally!

How can you as a parent or carer help in this process:

- Talk to your child about what career they want to pursue (they may not know yet) but talk to them anyway
- Please don't 'push' your child into careers they may not want or be capable of!
- Remember, it is your child's career, not yours!
- Lateness and absences are recorded on your child's reference so getting your child to school daily and on time is really important
- Ask us for a Unifrog log in and you can explore what courses are out there with your child
- Try to ensure that your child has a quiet place to study, ask to see their work, do they need to have their phone while studying/revising?

How can you as a parent or carer help in this process:

- Make sure that your child is getting enough sleep!
- Are they still on their phones late into the night? Do they need to be?
- I know parents of sixth form students who remove their child's phone, mouse and keyboard when it's time for sleep!
- Finally, communication is the key. If you need advice, help or support in relation to anything to do with your child in the sixth form, get in touch with us.
